- Show enterprise and imagination
- Work as a member of a team
- Develop self-reliance
- Develop leadership skills
- Recognise the needs, strengths and weaknesses of others
- Make decisions and accept the consequences
- Reflect on personal experience
- Enjoy and appreciate the countryside

OBSERVATION

The ability to observe is a skill that improves with practice.

- The completion of a physically demanding journey

Obviously it will depend on the location of the venture on what you choose to observe.

USEFULL IDEAS WHEN PREPARING PRESENTATIONS

- Descriptive writings and drawings bound in a portfolio.
- Mental maps, sketching a map of the journey and bringing it to life with drawings and feelings along the route.
- Collecting materials en-route to make a collage.
- Use the five senses to observe the venture and plan your presentation.
- As you lie in your sleeping bag, drinking your cocoa at the end of a satisfying day, meditate on the day's events and jot down anything that springs to mind.
- A well produces presentation provides an account that will be treasured in later life, long after the foul weather and blisters have been forgotten.
- Reports should include details of the dates and time of venture, together with objectives, goals and could conclude with your own view of the value of the activity.
- Summarising the experience of the venture and sharing them with others is an important and enjoyable part of the overall experience.
